Continuous evaluation is carried out throughout the year through regular tests, objective tests, projects, student presentations as per the requirements of the course. Routine tests are given and remedial instruction is given to slow learners and challenged students. For Post Graduate students there is provision for Test 1, Test 2, and Mid-term tests this help to prepare the students for University Examinations. Corrected answer scripts are shown to the students for scrutiny. The teachers explain-how scoring by the students can be better in forthcoming examinations by expressing themselves more appropriately in response to questions.

The academic calendar of the College is prepared in accordance with the calendar of the university and it has been strictly followed throughout the session for both undergraduate and postgraduate courses. For PG students, internal and external assessment system has been followed in the semester mode, whereas UG examination has been conducted in the annual mode in which only external assessment is applicable.
